EXTRA: THE 2ND WAVE

The Second Wave...

In our April 2021 Hospital Newsletter, Dr Peter Serwadda noted that "we [had] been very privileged as a country to have had a God given, though as yet unexplainable, break in the rate of infections which had peaked in December 2020 and January 2021." Unfortunately, starting May 2021 there was an exponential rise in the number of cases and a 2nd wave was formally declared. As the number of cases increased, hospitals rapidly filled with patients, at times oxygen supplies were not meeting demands and ICU beds became increasingly difficult to access. To help control the situation from spiraling out of control, President Museveni announced a partial lockdown at the beginning of June and on 18th June 2021 announced a much tighter lockdown for the next 42 days. Schools and churches are closed. Travel is hugely restricted, with no public transport or private cars, and movement between districts is only allowed in exceptional circumstances. Curfew is 7pm-5.30am. These restrictions have had the desired impact and over the past 2 weeks there has been a reduction in the number of reported cases and deaths.

What is KH's role in the pandemic?



The hospital recently released a comprehensive document outlining the role of KH and also the support needed to continue providing excellent and affordable healthcare during the pandemic. [For a link to the full document, click here.] **Dr Peter Serwadda** (*left*), Hospital Director, notes some of the multiple roles

of the hospital:

1. Testing for COVID-19

During the first wave, over 1000 samples for PCR testing were sent to central laboratories in Kampala and Entebbe. Since 7th June 2021, the hospital has been provided with COVID antigen rapid diagnostic test (RDT) kits for testing for COVID-19 on-site and to date over 730 tests have been done with a positivity rate of 38%. This includes 48 staff. Thankfully, so far all staff affected have been spared from severe or critical illness and were treated by isolation at home.



2. Vaccination against the virus

With support from the Ugandan Ministry of Health, KH is contributing to the national vaccination program. As of 30th June 2021, 619 people had been vaccinated on site. Further supplies are awaited to be able to continue this work.

3. Inpatient Treatment of COVID -19 patients

Using donations received during the first wave, KH has been able to develop part of male ward into a respiratory ward. Special areas have been developed on NICU and maternity to deal with these specific populations. Additionally, space has been repurposed to form a COVID theatre and labour suite.



What support does KH need?



Laureen Babirye, KH Business Development Manager, outlines the urgent needs that KH has identified in dealing with not only this coronavirus wave, but also potential future waves:

1. Oxygen Supplies

Due to a general critical oxygen situation in the country and at the hospital, KH management is seeking to purchase seven (7) more oxygen concentrators (10-litre -per-minute) and twelve (12) 6800-litre oxygen cylinders. The aim is to have one

concentrator for each ambulance, and one 10-litre-per-minute concentrator and a 6800-litre oxygen

cylinder (on standby) besides each of the 18 beds in the respiratory unit. Additionally, money is required for refilling of cylinders and for purchasing oxygen masks. 2. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

The exponential rise in the COVID-19 cases nationally has resulted in a sharp rise in the cost of PPEs. Unsurprisingly, this has coincided with a high demand of PPE at KH due to both increasing number of patients as well as new Ministry of Health recommendations such as double masking for those working in clinical areas. The hospital has tentatively projected the cost of PPE needed for the next 6 months.

3. Human Resource Needs—Continuity of Care

Due to staff needing to isolate with COVID-19, duty rosters have been rescheduled and locums hired. Therefore the staff wage bill has increased.



4. Continuity of HIV service

In the first wave, KH had major shifts in its activities regarding handling patients. In order to minimize crowding at the facility and hence cutting down COVID-19 transmission, distribution of HIV drugs (drug refills) to patients in their respective communities was suggested. Unfortunately, we currently do not have enough functioning vehicles to achieve this, and therefore KH is seeking to

repair the Toyota Landcruiser (UG 1168M) to facilitate mobility and hence distribution of the drugs.

5. Medical Records and OPD Modifications

KH plans to construct a client shelter at the medical record store to allow clients registering births etc to practice social distancing. Additionally, a protective barrier between staff and patients undergoing triage at OPD is needed.

IN SUMMARY, KH desires to be prepared not only for the coming weeks and months of the current wave, but the hugely uncertain future we are all facing, particularly taking into consideration that other countries around the world are facing third or more waves. The following table shows the projected costs.
