Exciting Start to the Theatre Project

On 12th February we realised a dream that has been in pipeline for nearly 10 years ago - the start of a 9-month, 610 Million UGX project to expand and refurbish our operating theatres.

Upon completion, we shall have 4 additional theatre rooms including an endoscopy unit. Our doctors and surgeons will then be able to

operate on patients whenever required as opposed to the past trend where surgeons had to give up scheduled procedures in the operating rooms for emergency cases if they occurred.

We particularly want to thank the Friend brothers who through the remarkable Friendship Atlantic rowing challenge raised significant funds to facilitate this process and help turn our dream into a reality.

The funds raised to date will allow great progress. However, to complete the full project and furnish theatres we need a further 183 Million UGX. Please pray for the necessary funds to come through.





General Fund Appeal

Kiwoko Hospital remains committed to our mission of providing accessible, affordable, curative and preventive healthcare for the holistic healing for the poor and vulnerable; reaching out to the community and training health workers in partnership with individuals and institutions of like mind.

60% of our budget is funded by our donors and partners, 30% is

> covered by subsidised patient fees and 10% is a grant from the Ugandan government. Worldwide the cost of living has

increased. This has impacted the hospital in numerous ways, but some of the more noticeable recent increased costs significantly impacting our General Fund budget have been:

1) Fuel and Vehicle Maintenance

With the current state of the roads, our cars have been depreciating at a very high rate. Repair and maintenance costs have gone over and above budget, with the expense standing at 115% by Ouarter 3 in the Financial Year. The vehicles are vital for the running of the community outreach clinics and ambulances are always on standby to refer patients who

require more advanced treatment to Kampala.

2) Estates and Maintenance

Most of our buildings (wards and staff houses) were constructed between 1990 and 1995. Having been in existence for 25 - 30 years, we have experienced leaking roofs, cracking floors, faded wall paints, a few broken windows and doors with hinges broken off, and water gutters, lights and light holders all in need of repair. The drainage, plumbing and soak pits equally need to be continuously repaired. This has caused our Estates Department operating expenditure to go over and above the budget.

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Mental Health Clinic Update

Many people, regardless of age, background or education, will encounter challenges with their mental health at some point in their lives.

Sunday Steven

Take an example of 20year old Sunday Steven [permission given to share picture and story). Sunday and his little brother were abandoned by their parents. Financial challenges resulted in his mother leaving, then his father also started leaving home without any explanation. Sometimes, he would be gone for days, weeks or months, leaving the two little boys at the mercy of a neighbour to provide food and medication. This was traumatic for Sunday, he did not feel like other children and became depressed. He lacked love and guidance; his family was broken. Even though Sunday turned to gambling, drinking alcohol and taking drugs he felt no better.

One day, Sunday decided to visit a doctor at Adara Youth Community Centre in Kiwoko. After their assessment, he was referred to Kiwoko Hospital Mental health clinic where he was diagnosed with depression with psychotic features. Sunday received treatment and is now starting to feel much better.

"We noticed that he is a clever young man, so we asked him to take up some of the tasks during mental health clinic days on Tuesdays and Fridays as part of psychotherapy for him," said Derrick Kikabi, our Mental Health Clinic Manager.

Sunday did not get a chance to go to school, but he is taking care of himself and his little brother with the help of their neighbour. He now can see purpose to life.

The Challenges

Despite the fact that approximately 30% of Ugandans have mental health illnesses, this is an area that is given little attention in many societies in Uganda. Additionally, many people with mental health illnesses face major stigmatisation from the communities where they live.

Kiwoko Hospital Mental Health Clinic has over 1000 registered patients, mostly from the districts of Nakaseke, Luweero and Nakasongola, and this year has received an influx of patients from Wakiso and Kampala districts. The clinic registers 50-70 new patients monthly. In addition to an increased number of patients registered at the clinic, the complexity of cases has also increased

The remit of the clinic is far beyond what would be seen in many higher resource settings, managing not only conditions typically seen in psychiatry clinics but also epilepsy, sleep disorders, autism, attention deficit hyperactive disorder, learning disorders, cerebral palsy and developmental delay.

Outpatient clinic days are Tuesday and Friday, with other weekdays used to manage more complicated cases, and carry out community mental health clinics and education.

Current Needs

The clinic offers free services to all patients. We thank **Adara Development** for supporting the clinic for many years, enabling drugs to be provided at not cost to patients. Many of these drugs are costly and we need more support to continue this free service.

There is need to improve the hospital facilities to meet the needs. We urgently need a patient shelter to protect patients from sun and rain as they await clinic appointments. Additionally, with time, the team hopes to have a specific ward/area for management of complex psychiatric patients, with the aim of managing patients better especially those who are particularly aggressive or distressed.

We thank the team for their continued dedication in this work.

Patient Testimonial: Prossy's Story



Prossy

"We thought our mother had been bewitched!" says Prossy. "She got ill, and we took her to hospital thinking it was malaria. Instead of getting better, she was only getting worse. We moved from one hospital to another trying to rescue our mother but nothing seemed to work. It worsened when she could not recognize any of us, her 6 children. She

started hallucinating and making up images, she was always being chased by figures that we could not understand."

"One day, when the Kiwoko Mental Health team visited our village in Buzibweera (40km from Kiwoko Hospital), they immediately identified that our mother had a mental illness. They gave her

some drugs and registered her as a patient to receive free monthly treatment. Our mother is now alive and well. The team still comes to check on her at home. I have since then become an advocate of mental health. If I see and suspect any patient in our village, I immediately bring them to Kiwoko Hospital."

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Sr. Esther Nabakka: Life at Kiwoko Hospital since 1990

Sr. Esther Nabakka came to learn of Kiwoko Hospital in 1990 at the age of 21. She had just completed her A level studies but could not continue into further education due to lack of school fees. Her father had died 15 years previously, leaving Esther, her 4 siblings and their mum under the care of his brother (their uncle). So Esther left her mum and siblings in Nakasongola, and went to stay with her uncle in Nakaseke.

One day, as she was sitting at home wondering what to do with life, her uncle's wife informed her that some 'whites' had opened up a hospital and wanted workers. She encouraged her to apply for any job. So Esther made her way to Kiwoko Hospital in search of a job and, fortunately, she was assigned some tasks. The surgeons needed assistance collecting instruments from the wards and bringing them to the central sterilizing unit for sorting, cleaning and sterilizing. This became her job and she did it with so much passion that she developed the urge to go back to school to study nursing and midwifery. She shared this dream with her uncle and her boss, Dr. Ian Clarke. Dr. Ian encouraged her to apply but her uncle was a little hesitant as he was not sure of where tuition would come from.

Nonetheless, Esther went ahead to apply for a certificate course in nursing and midwifery in a school in the city.

Karen Morgan, who was then lab manager, visited the city school and discovered that Esther had been shortlisted for admission. She excitedly returned to Kiwoko and broke the great news to Esther. Esther, however, had mixed feelings after receiving the news: a sense of joy that she could finally go back to study but worry and anxiety as to where the tuition would come from.

Shortly after this, she was invited to Dr. Ian's office and didn't know what to expect when she was called to the boss' office. On arrival, he handed her a letter that said that the hospital would pay her tuition fees, and after training return to KH to be formally employed. This was the turning point in her life. Esther went to school and returned to work at the hospital. She now could support her mum and siblings.

During her free time, when she was not working at the hospital, Esther would return home in Nakasongola to practice agriculture with her family. Mangoes particularly seemed to do well in that region. So, they concentrated on mango farming and the earnings during the season were quite good!

All her siblings have managed to acquire at least basic education. Their last born went through fashion school and is now a tailor. They have also managed to construct a small house for their mum.

Esther will be turning 55 years old this year. She has worked at Kiwoko Hospital all her life, particularly in theatre and maternity ward. She is grateful when she meets parents with their grown children and they say 'this is your child,' simply because she helped birth them. She never did get married or have children of her own because she had a task of looking after her family.

As she nears retirement age, Esther encourages her fellow staff members to work diligently at their jobs. She also expresses great thankfulness to the donors because no staff member has ever gone without pay every month.
