A Patient Story

I have loved helping the medical and nursing staff over the last few years as they continue to deliver quality care to their patients. It has been a steep learning curve but maybe after 4 visits I am starting to get the hang of some of it at least. There are always daily challenges but it is such a joy to see basic medical care restore more and Ugandans to good health sometimes in very miraculous ways.

It is hard to pick out any individual cases but I was struck by the story of one young father of four who was admitted in late January in a very poor state. He had been to a few health centres and had some outpatient treatment. He needed admitted as he had an overwhelming infection, a terrible skin affliction and lots of other medical issues. His wife who stayed with him constantly was also expecting their fifth child in a few weeks. For the first few

days after admission he was not able to converse much but slowly and surely he made



progress with good robust treatment and with careful nursing care and regular physiotherapy he started to come alive. This is when his character started to shine through and soon he was teaching me to count to five in L'uganda so I could help him number his ever increasing family! He and his wife seemed very close and I was struck by their determination to follow on with what would be for them a difficult medical journey. On discharge I was nervous that he would not return for on-going treatment as is often the case with patients who have long term conditions. Support and counselling and continual encouragement by our whole team of doctors, nurses, physiotherapists and counsellors obviously paid off as he was back right on time for his follow up appointment and what a joy it was to see him — looking much better, with near complete healing of his extensive skin ulceration and more importantly he was taking his health sustaining medication reliably.

I pray that he continues to stay well.....

Frank is on a Mission

Frank Ssekyewa is the assistant in-charge at OPD and also a senior nurse in the diabetic and eye clinics.

An active member of the mission team for years, he has recently taken on a more active leadership role assisting Shadrach by taking on responsibility for outreach and evangelism in and around the hospital.

Frank's early years in Kampala were chaotic. He slept at home with his grandmother, but during the day he and his friends foraged for food in the

neighbourhood as his family had limited resources to care for him. His education started when a local witchdoctor offered to pay for his school fees because the man had noted that Frank didn't cheat him when sent on errands.

An uncle took Frank to New Hope orphanage (near Kiwoko Hospital) in 1999 at the age of 14. After a year he surrendered his life to Christ. He gave his first sermon when he was 15 years old. 2 young men gave their lives to Christ. He is now an accom-

plished preacher, still trusting in God who has dealt with his fears and given him hope for the future.

At New Hope he completed O-levels and came to Kiwoko to study as a nurse.

Frank's greatest passion is to see people enjoying God and growing in their knowledge of Him. He is a blessing to many in Kiwoko and those who come to OPD seeking help. Please pray for Frank in his new role as Deputy Mission Team Leader.


Friends of Kiwoko Hospital, Northern Ireland
