Message from Dr. Rory Wilson, our Medical Director



August 16-18th saw three days of fun for more than 200 children in the Kiwoko community, led by 35 willing and committed team leaders (staff and students at Kiwoko Hospital). The theme for this year's Ekisa was 'I was lost but Jesus found me' and the Bible teaching was based on the parables in Luke 15. Through the stories of the Lost Sheep, Lost Coin and Lost Son, we learned about how God searches for us and that through Jesus we are found and rescued. All the children and leaders alike had a lot of fun through singing, dancing, games, craft activities and quizzes. Many parents have told of us how their children enjoyed themselves, but we're particularly happy that many seemed to have understood more about God's love for them. We have heard them singing the Ekisa memory verse song around the hospital! We pray that these children will go on following Jesus even though Ekisa has ended, and that the weekly Children's ministry at Kiwoko would reinforce this message week by week in these children's lives.



New anaesthetic machine saves a life in its first day in operation



3/9/13 Kiwoko Hospital received a new anaesthetics machine for its busy operating theatre. The new machine, paid for by the generosity of DAK and Rotary, was designed and manufactured in the UK by Diamedica based near Barnstable, Devon. It has been specifically designed and tested in developing countries such as Uganda, is robust enough to survive in difficult conditions and simple enough to maintain by local engineers without the need to call in expensive specialists.

On receiving the new machine, the Senior Hospital Surgeon, Dr. Peter Serwadda, said, "I am delighted that the hospital now has a new anaesthetic machine which will enable us to continue to carry out operations safely and to provide the best care to our patients. It is important to us that the machine is easy to use, strong and simple to maintain as our patients' lives depend on it and it will be in heavy use on a daily basis".

Male ward refurbished at last to enable better safety for patients and staff

The new male ward was finished, commissioned and opened for use in early September. We thank God for all those who used their skills to improve the building and the funding provided to enable this to take place. We appreciate the efforts of all the staff who worked hard to get the project finished. The building has the capacity for 32 beds and is also being used by the T.B. department.
